

When Does Your Present Chauffeurs License Expire

Albany, February 1 — Approximately 100,000 New York State chauffeurs will be required to renew their licenses between now and February 28, the Department of Motor Vehicles said today.

The Department mailed punch and applications to these drivers

Some of the drivers, roughly Some of the drivers, roughly one-third, will be required to submit proof that their eyesight meets the state standard of 20/40 in either or both eyes, with or without corrective lenses, or take a vision test at an issuing office. Certificates from physicians, optometrists, oculists, or ophthalmological will estimate the requirement. logists will satisfy the requirement when submitted with the renewal

when submitted with the renewal application.

Applicant who must comply with the vision requirement will find their applications marked "Visiom Test Required", on the reverse stde of the three stubs. Those whose last name initials begin with "A" through "F" are in this group. Chauffeurs are urged to check the expiration date on their licenses and complete the renewal process as quickly as possible if they are among the 100,000 whose licenses expire on February 28. They should receive their applications within the next week.
