In November of 1962 The Veterans Administration decided to reduce the average daily member load at the Bath Domiciliary by about 300 effective June 1963 and asked for additional cutbacks after that date. However through the response of the many veterans and the backing of Congressmen, this cutback was stemed at 300.
Now about 2 years later we are faced with a total cutback and elimination of a \$20,000,000 investment which is doing the job.
The Bath VA Center is the only domiciliary in the entire Northeastern United States. It serves a ten state area which approximately 9,000,000 are veterans. It is the stated purpose of the Congress of the United States to provide for the care of aged Veterans.
Not only would the proposed

provide for the care of aged Veterans.

Not only would the proposed closing of the Bath VA Hospital completely crush the economic foundation of that community, but it would deprive the domiciliary patients of the critically needed therapy provided by their proximity to family, friends and home.

If there is to be a cutback in government spending it should not be made at the expense of Veterans dependent on these facilities.
