Allegany County Civil Defense

Allengany County now has 32

Allengany County now has 32 fixed monitoring stations and each of them will be suitably marked with fallout monitoring station decals, according to an announcement today by Robert L. Coulter, County Civil Defense Director.

There are 2,253 local fallout monitoring stations established and equipped in New York State. Several areas have only one such station while others have as many as 97, depending on the population and area of the local Civil Defense jurisdiction.

"In Allegany County there are 134 trained radiological monitors who in an emergency will make fallout radiation measurements."

134 trained radiological monitors who in an emergency will make fallout radiation measurements on a round-the-clock basis," Mr. Coulter said. "Their services would be invaluable in protecting the public against fallout resulting from a nuclear attack.

"A fixed monitoring station is a location at which trained monitors will perform radiological monitoring functions in the event of nuclear attack.

"Radiation measurements will be required from all areas including those where only sheltered operations are fessible. A fixed monitoring station provides the capability to measure dose rates in those areas where measurements made by mobile methods would be extremely hazardous.

"When radiation levels permit, the instruments assigned to the monitoring stations can be used in mobile or aerial monitoring missions. Radiation measurements will be reported, or relayed to County control centers for plotting and analysis by radiological defense officers in accordance with established Civil Defense operational plans," Mr. Coulter said.
