St. Valentine's Day
Believe it or not, St. Valentine's Day has not always meant the giving of presents or cards to that special someone. On the contrary, it was originally supposed to have been a Christian feast commemorating the martyrdom of St. Valentine on February 14, 270 A.D. By the fourteenth century however the religious significance of this day was soon replaced by the nonreligious customs with which we, today, associate Valentine's Day. As a matter of fact, the customs we observe today are in no way related to the life of St. Valentine, except that the feast day is the same.
There have been several theories on how the sending of greeting cards and love tokens on this day was originated, but they are all believed to be quite inaccurate. The accepted explanation is that today's St. Valentine's Day is a survival of a Roman festival held on February 15.
One of the original nonreligious customs is very interesting, although it has become quite unpracticed through the years. Lots were drawn to decide which young men and women should be each other's "Valentine" for the coming year. Gifts were then exchanged and sometimes an engagement or marriage resulted. Today, to the great delight of the ladies, it is the custom for the men to send sentimental Valentines, flowers and candy. This is, perhaps, a safer custom than the one originally practiced.
