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Greenwood Central School News

Susan Edwards, a senior at the Greenwood Central School, has been selected to receive the Bausch & Lomb Honorary Science Medal. This award is presented at commencement to the senior with the highest average in their science studies during their high school career.

In 8500 secondary schools throughout the nation, the Award is presented to the graduating student with the best record in science studies. Since its introduction in 1932, there have been 179,000 winners. Surveys indicate that about one-third of this number have been encouraged by the Award to attend college and follow scientific careers.

January Milk Brings \$4.36

New York, Feb. 12 — Dairy Farmers will receive a uniform farm price of \$4.36 per hundredweight for January milk deliveries in the New York-New Jersey milkshed, Dr. A. J. Pollard, acting market administrator has announced. The December price was \$4.49; dairymen got \$4.43 in January, 1964.

The producer butterfat differential will be computed at the rate of 5.6 cents for each tenth of a pound of fat above or below the 3.5 percent standard.

Dr. Pollard said that receipts from producers were 57,117,638 pounds higher than a year ago and that total sales of fluid milk (Class I) rose 4,123,908 pounds. Receipts totaled 1,002,622,648 pounds of which 495,018,073 pounds were sold as fluid.

Class I milk made up 49.4 percent of the January pool, compared to 51.9 percent in January 1964. Handlers paid \$5.50 per hundredweight for milk they received in the 201-210 mile zone and sold as fluid.

The acting administrator reported that while the number of producers in the pool was 1,843 below a year ago, or 40,644, average deliveries per day per dairy rose 78 pounds to 796 pounds. The number of handlers' reports used

in computing the pool declined by 32 to 287.

The farm value of the January production was \$44,890,811.65. Dr. Pollard pointed out that this

does not include all the differentials paid to dairy farmers.

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
