Editorial

Next Monday, Andover Central School, along with many other public institutions, will take the day off to commemorate the birthday of a great American leader. We all know that this leader is, of course, George Washington.

Washington gave many years of service to our new country. During the critical years before the Constitution was adopted, Washington served as Commander-in-Chief of the Army. Through the Revolutionary War, he stayed with the Army, not retiring until two years after the final victory.

Called from Mount Vernon, where he had happily spent the next few years, he served at the Constitutional Convention. His election as chairman indirectly placed on him the responsibility of the Convention's disobedience. (The Convention had been ordered to revise the Articles of Confederation, not create a new Constitution.) And when the delegates began quarreling among themselves, the mere sight of Washington's majestic figure would remind them of their task.

Then came his election as First President in 1789. For the next eight years he carried the weight of the most troublesome years of the Presidency. In his second term he helped the new Country through a period of near-war with Great Britain.

Following his term as President, he returned to the life he loved - that of a gentleman-farmer. However, when war with France threatened America, Washington was called back to ready an army if war was declared. The threat passed and Washington went home where he died shortly after.

In all, George Washington gave himself to the new country for almost twenty-five years. His mere presence inspired his countrymen. Harry Lee summed up Washington's great service with these words: "First in war, first in peace, first in the hearts of his countrymen."
