#### New Vegetable Varieties Offered For Home Gardens

Home gardeners will soon be making lists of vegetable seeds and plants they intend to buy. Here are suggestions on varieties, mostly-new, from Prof. Philip A. Minges, vegetable crops special ist, N. Y. State College of Agricultude at Cornell

ist, N. I. State Conege of Agri-cultude at Cornell.

Tomato varieties, resistant to both Verticillium and Fusarium Wilts, are now available. Vertic-illium Wilt is cometimes a problem in soils where tomatoes, po-tatoes, and strawberries have been grown over a number of years. Fusarium Wilt is a problem in warmer climates, such as on Long

Galaxy, an early producer, is restant to Verticillium. Heinz sistant to Verticillium. Heinz
1350 a later variety, resists both
wilts and is good for canning and
eating. Try these tomato varieties where the garden has been in
the same spot many years.

Fantastic is a good, fairly early
whild tomato but is not wilt re-

rantastic is a good, fairly early hybrid tomato but is not wilt resistant. Tom Tom, a large, wilt-resistant hybrid, is similar to Big Boy which has large fruits. Garder and Fireball, older varieties, are still recommended for early ripening though neither is wilt resistant.

Lettuce Buttercrunch and Summer Bibb, for early spring and fall plantings, are excellent for

Summer Bibb, for early spring and fall plantings, are excellent for tossed salads.

Peppers — Lincoln Bell, Delaware Belle, and Staddon's Select are bell types and the latter two are resistant to tobacco mosaic. Pennwonder is a standard, popular variety still recommended.

Sweet Corn — Seneca Explorer, a very early variety, is worth testing. Spring Gold is fairly early. Maturing slightly later are Honey and Cream or Better and Sugar with their yellow and white, tender, sweet kernels.

Later varieties recommended are Gold Cup, Seneca Chief, and Wonderful Silver Queen, a white kernel corn, is of high quality.

Snap Beans — Tendercrop remains one of the best eating of the green varieties. Tenderette is a new, white seeded tendercrop. Bush Blu Lake, with distinctive flavor, is later than Tendercrop, but may not be available this year because of lack of seed.

Two yellow wax beans include Kinghorn Wax and Eastern Butter-wax.

Peas — Some of the smaller-

Some of the smallerpodded varieties like Freezonian,
Perfected Freezer 60, and Frosty
yield a higher percentage of shellyield a nigher percentage of sen-ed peas per pound of pods than the common large-podded variet-ies. For those preferring the larger pods, Greater Progress is

suggested.

Muskmelons — Two new varieties are Saticoy Hybrid which is Muskmelons — Two new racies are Saticoy Hybrid which is very sweet, and Maine Rock.
