Canisteo, Greenwood and Andover Fire Departments battled a house fire in a 30-miles-per-hour wind and a blustery snowstorm from 2:15 a. m. until after 7 a. m., Saturday morning and were successful in saving the house owned by Richard Call of Bath, located two miles from Hartsville, at the foot of Call Hill Road. The main floor of the two-story house was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Hallett and family, who were awakened at about 2 a. m. Saturday by the smell of smoke. The fire apparently started in the flue of a chimney from a wood stove in the living room, according to Deputy Fire Coordinator for Steuben County, Jack Meyer, who is also fire chief of the Canisteo Department. Firemen moved furniture from the Hallett apartment to the front and back porches and succeeded in saving most of it. Meyer said that tankers from Greenwood and from Andover, under County and Inter-County Mutual Aid, were used in the fire-fighting operation. Water supply was low and firemen chopped a hole in surface ice in an adjacent creek to aid in fighting the blaze.

Rebecca Wingert, 15, of Canandaigua, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Wingert, and a sophomore at Belfast Central School, has been adjudged winner of the Youthpower Contest sponsored throughout the county recently by the Allegany County Farm Bureau women's committee. As a winner, she will go to Syracuse Friday and Saturday to participate in the State Youthpower Congress and to have her entry judged for possible further honors. State winners in the male and female categories will qualify for an all-expense paid trip to Chicago, on March 24-27, as guests of the National Youthpower Congress.
