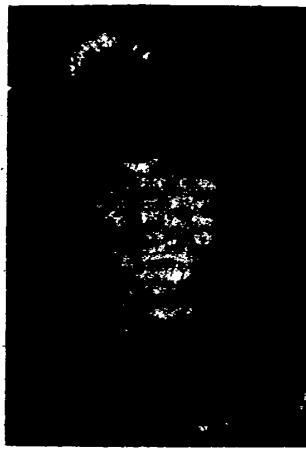

## News That's Print To Fit

Well, the inevitable finally happened Tuesday afternoon when an oil-switch down at the Village Sub-Station malfunctioned and Main St. business places as well as residences on some of the side Streets were without electricity for an hour and 32 minutes — according to the Bank Clock.

Fortunately, a Village Employee noticed smoke coming from the switch and was able to take immediate action before any damage occurred. More fortunately yet — from electrical subscribers point-of-view — a former Village Electrical Dept. Superintendent, Jim Burgett, was available for immediate assistance and was able to effect emergency repairs in a short span of time.

There were no material losses reported to us, so outside the loss of time suffered from the power "outage" — this time we were lucky. However, what would happen if "Jim" wasn't around this vicinity — or if the damage was done to a part that couldn't be repaired easily? Think what would happen to the stock of frozen foods at the local grocery stores and drug store — as well as in your home freezer. Let alone the loss of man-hours and business, since most local machinery from gas pumps to compressors, presses, linotype, and even most heating systems use electric controls.

When complaints and trouble were first aired in the Electric Department — we knew what many of the problems were — and figured we would give the boys a reasonable length of time to get things straightened out. Thus we kept quiet about the subject (which was unusual for us) not wanting to add to the problems on hand — or forcing a hasty decision to be made by the Village Fathers. However around 6 months have rolled by since then so it would appear as if action should be taken pretty soon to remedy this situation.

If a qualified man can't be found for the present assigned salary perhaps a little more "oomph of the realm" will have to be added to make the position enticing enough so that it can be filled by a competent and ambitious technician. From where we sit — it doesn't seem as if we need a College Graduate with an Electrical Engineering Diploma to run and maintain our Village distribution system. If such services were needed at any time it seems as if a consulting Engineer could be called in for a day or two to make up the necessary plans etc.

Boy, a couple of nice days like the last two — sure helps to give a feller a touch of Spring Fever! Especially when we hear noises of Wild Geese flying over — heading North we guess.
