Swimming Finals

Last Saturday at 8:00 p. m., in the swimming pool at Wayland six A. C. S. swimmers participated in the Southern Tier Swimming Finals. Those six were: Jeff Common, Bill Grossman, Dave Peckham, Clair Updyke, Dick Lang and Larry Cook.

All six boys placed in the top three in their events. Jeff Common, participating in his final meet for Andover took top honors winning two first place metals. The first in the 200 yard Freestyle, and the second in the 400 yard Freestyle. Bill Grossman, also swimming for the last time metal in the 50' yard Freestyle. for Andover won a third place. The two relay teams also placed. The first team, made up of Lang, Updyke, Cook and Peckham, came in third in the 200 Yard Medley Relay. The second team made up of Updyke, Peckham, Cook and Grossman lost first place in the 200 yard Freestyle Relay, by a second to Wayland. The times were Wayland 1:47.9 and Andover 1:48.9. Andover was well represented, and came home with 11 metals only to be beaten by Wayland with 13 and Canistota with 12.

Andover and Naples were the smallest schools that participated, with Naples having twice as many boys enrolled in high school as Andover. The A. C. S. Finmen are to be congratulated for doing a fine job.

These same six boys will participate in the Sectional Championship Meet at Genesee State Teachers College this Saturday, March 13th for the last swimming meet of this season.
