\$26 Million Highway Program Planned In Hornell District

Under Proposed 1965-66 Budget
Albany — A \$26 million State highway program is projected in the six-county Hornell District of the State Department of Public Works in the 1965-66 fiscal year under Governor Rockefeller's proposed budget, the Department announced March 16, 1965.

Area Motorists Will Benefit
Local Area Motorists will certainly be pleased to know that several of these projects will remedy a couple of sections of highway that are just about the worst in the State.

Two of the projects will be carried out on Route 17 in Steuben County, one from the Allegany-Steuben County line easterly 5.47 miles to Greenwood, and the other from Greenwood easterly 3.85 miles to a point near the intersection of Route 36 west of Jasper.

Another terrible section that will be taken care of is the Reconstruction of Route 243 in Allegany County, from Route 19 at Caneadea westerly 6.6 miles to a point beyond Rushford, which will be bypassed. About half the section will be rebuilt on new location and hills and curves will be modified in the \$1.5 million project.

Record 501 Votes Cast In Local Village Election

A record 501 Voters turned out for Tuesday's Local Village Election which surprised even the Candidates engaged in the fray. Mayor Paul Kilbane, unopposed, scored 377 votes; with Charles Ruger leading the Trustee vote with 315 votes; Howard McAndrew, 273; Ronald Taylor, 214 and Richard Wittie 132.

There were 2 votes cast by write-ins for Mayor with F. G. Crawford receiving one and former Mayor Hugh Barlow getting the other.

The voting machine tally actually read 502 but it skipped one number between 490 and 500 which accounted for the apparent discrepancy.

Several voters showed up to vote after the polls were closed and others working out of town remarked that they would have been able to vote if the polls had been open until 8 or 9 P. M., as they are in General Election.

The challenging Candidates put a great deal of effort into their campaign coming out with Presidential Type Campaign Posters which were actually real photographs; while the Republican incumbents came out with a letter on Monday claiming credit for almost everything good that had been accomplished in the Village limits during the past few years with their No. 1 item being the completion of the new State Highway Route 21.

Clarence R. Baker

Clarence R. Baker, formerly of 61 Sawyer St., Hornell, died Monday, March 15, 1965 in Tampa, Fla., where he had been living since last October. He was 71 years old.

A native of Andover, he spent most of his life in Sidney, having moved to Hornell two years ago. He had been employed by the Scintilla Magneto Division of Bendix Aviation Corp., at Sidney, retiring in 1956 after 23 years with the firm.

Well, now that the smoke has cleared away from the local election battle, it is up to every interested Citizen to get in back of our Village Officials and see that things are taken care of that should be — with the hiring of an Electric Superintendent as Top Priority.

It is also the duty of every Citizen to point out things that they think are wrong to these officials, and if they are not corrected — then they should attend the Village Board Meetings and find out why.

As far as the election itself is concerned, there was certainly a wonderful turn-out of voters with 501 local citizens casting their ballots; with a total population of only 1241 people at the last Census, we didn't realize that there were over 500 eligible voters — yet there were quite a few people that didn't get back from work in time to vote!

Which reminds us — all across the country citizens are going on protest marches — running off at the mouth about discrimination against Negro Voters; and yet, in many local communities — discrimination is being shown against the working man that doesn't get home from work until after 6 P. M. (And don't forget the women that work at Alfred.)

It would seem as if the polls should be open from 12:00 Noon until at least 8:00 or 9:00 P. M. — at least on Election Day.

(Which comes only once a year for Village Elections). After all that hour can't be too late for the Village Board since they themselves chose to hold Grievance Day hours from 7:00 P. M. until 11:00 P. M., this past year. This entirely excluded all of the people working at the Pre-Heater and Worthington on the afternoon shift, so that if they had wanted to appear with a grievance — they would have had to lay off work to do it.

In passing we feel, that the important thing gleamed from the fray was the fact that many voters are not satisfied and are beginning to take an active interest to see that things are changed. After all, one or two Board Members can't change things very much — when they are out-numbered and opposed on vital issues.

While still on the election subject — we heard quite a few comments about the legality of a Village Board Member — and Candidate's wife serving on the Election Board. In fact one person told us that he went as far as to ask the County Election Board about this point with the answer being: "that it is legal — but not in good taste".

Boy, winter sure hates to give up doesn't it? Just take a look at the Low Temperatures that the "Boys down at the Pump Station" have recorded for the past week: the 12th: Low 6, High 27; — 13th L. 5, H. 34; — 14th: L. 10, H. 38; — 15th: L. 25, H. 34; — 16th L. 25, H. 34; — 17th: L. 11, H. 30; — and today's Low was 26.
