



**SOCIAL NOTES**

All but one of Allegany County's 15 high schools have enrolled students this year at the State University Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred, according to statistics compiled by Registrar Alan D. Willsey. Heading the list is Wellsville High School with 45 students. Other Allegany County High Schools and the number of students enrolled at Alfred Tech include: Alfred-Almond Central School, 15; Andover Central School, 12; Scio Central School, 10; Belmont Central School, 8; Fillmore Central School, 7; Angelica, Belfast, and Friendship Central Schools, 5. Bolivar and Cuba Central Schools, 4; Richburg and Rushford Central Schools, 3; and Canaseraga Central School, 2. Whitesville Central School enrolled no students at the two-year college for this academic year.

Corning East and Alfred-Almond are expected to join the Southern Tier high school swim conference next season. Dansville will be a possibility with in two years. Odessa has applied for membership. The present members are Wayland, Canisteo, Hornell, Andover, Bath and Naples.

Members of the North Hornell Village Board have approved a building permit for an addition to Bethesda Hospital at an estimated cost of \$375,000, according to Mayor Frederic D. Simons.

Governor Scranton's proposed ten-year highway improvement plan, designed to make "Pennsylvania first in highways", allocates \$50,000,000 for new or re-built roads, with 80 percent of it to be spent on 81 miles of primary roads. The remaining eleven million is earmarked for secondary roads. Described as a "revolution" in highway building, the ten-million dollar state wide program was proposed last month by the governor to the General Assembly. In urging the program for highway improvement, Gov. Scranton placed roads second in importance only to education. Allegany County stands to gain by Gov. Rockefeller's \$3.5 billion budget when the State Public Works Department announced a 26-million roadbuilding program which is foremost among two Allegany programs is the rebuilding of Rt. 243 from Cananda 6.6 miles westward.

**Fifth Annual Trout Derby To Open April 1st**

Some 10,000 men, women and child-anglers are expected to pack the tiny grape community of Naples, N. Y., for the Fifth Annual Naples Creek Rainbow Trout Derby on Thursday, April 1.

It's fool-the-fish day once again as this village strives to enhance its reputation as the "Trout Capital of The Finger Lakes". At stake in the all-day Derby is some three times the money offered last year when 10,000 fishermen sloshed their way to-and-through Naples Creek's 30 miles of tributaries and 20 trout "hot spots". Offered to skillful anglers is \$295 in cash prizes, including the \$100 that goes with the famous Louis A. Wehle Trophy, awarded annually for the largest Rainbow of the day.

Besides being the opening-day of trout season in this Ontario County farm community, it's also April Fool's Day. But there is generally little levity when fishermen from as far away as Canada and Virginia vie for honors and cash prizes. Tension mounts each hour as new catches are weighed and tagged throughout the day at Derby headquarters in the Naples Village Hall. Up on a peg board go the leading fish—for all to see and shoot at. Current all-time record for Naples Creek Rainbow Trout is: 15-pounds, 5 ounces.

Just about everyone is a winner in the Derby. For the not-so-lucky, there's fresh air, conviviality and free coffee supplied thru-out the day by the Maxfield Hose Company, Naples Volunteer Fire Department. For all those who do reel-in a Rainbow—whatever the size—the local winery has a

prize: a bottle of Lake Niagara or Lake Roselle wine. Second largest trout receives \$75. And \$50 goes to the angler who registers the day's third biggest catch.

In the Senior Division, the oldest person registering a fish takes home ten dollars. Those under 14-years of age enter Rainbows in a special derby-within-a-Derby. Besides being eligible for the biggest-in-Derby prizes, youngsters will also vie for three awards of \$15, \$10 and \$5 for the three heaviest fish caught. Similar prizes totaling \$30 will also be awarded by drawing for "blind weight", giving every successful angler a chance to win a cash prize despite the size of his fish.

General Chairman of this year's Naples Trout Derby is local Sportsman, George Preston.

**Tax Benefits For Older Americans**

A free guide to special tax benefits available to persons 65 years of age and over has just been issued by the Internal Revenue Service in cooperation with the President's Council on Aging.

The publication, "Tax Benefits for Older Americans", is especially important to the retired person living on a fixed pension or annuity. The 16-page booklet uses many examples to make these provisions easily understood.

The changes made by the 1964 tax law affecting older taxpayers

are fully covered in the publication. For example, it explains how the new minimum standard deduction may reduce tax liability for many taxpayers. It also shows how removal of the 1 percent floor on medicine and drug expenses now makes all allowable medical expenses fully deductible for those 65 and over.

There is a full explanation of the new tax treatment of the sale of a personal residence. There is now no federal income tax on the profits from such sales when certain conditions are met and the price is \$20,000 and under. For sales over \$20,000 only a portion of the profits may be taxable.

Other items covered are the higher gross income requirements for filing returns; tax rate benefits for surviving spouse and head

of household; the added exemptions for age and blindness; pensions and annuities; and the retirement income credit.

**Tax Benefits for Older Americans**, IRS Document No. 5539, is now available free from Buffalo District Internal Revenue Service offices, it was announced recently by District Director John E. Foley.

**(Estimated Income Tax)**

If you are an individual required to file a declaration of estimated income tax for 1965, you are reminded to file on Form 1040-ES no later than April 15, 1965, said District Director John E. Foley of Internal Revenue in Buffalo.

In such case, you are required to pay at least 25% of your 1965 estimated income tax no later than April 15, 1965.

Document No. 5111, which contains detailed information on the subject of estimated taxes, is available from the Internal Revenue Service.
