is marked AWG 600V Type E-Type RHW 75C General Electric Versatol Geoprene S1-58004. The type used to replace this badly burned up (or should we say melted —) wire, was Style RR 5,000V wire — which is adequate for the job.

We have been told by an authoritative source that the primary current in the underground wiring to these Main St., mercury vapor lights is 1,800 Volts. How then, was 600 Volt rated wire allowed to be installed when 1,800 Volt current was to pass thru this wire?

When we were on our way to the Policeman's Ball in Hornell Saturday night, we noticed that the lights were still out on the North End of Main St. — but Lo!, and we could behold!, when we arrived in Hornell, "The lights were on again — at least in this part of the world" which led us to believe that perhaps the "War is Really Over".
