## Hearing Held On Village Budget

The Public Hearing on the 1965 Proposed Village Budget and Regular Monthly Board Meeting was held Tuesday evening with Five Taxpayers attending the Budget Hearing session.

Questions were raised as to the necessity of the \$2 per thousand increase in the Village Tax Levy with the following explanations being presented:

These are decreed by the Power Authority that the General Fund must pay to the Electric Depart-

ment. This constitutes the General Fund share of office rent and electricity used which can not be contributed by the Electric Department.

Following the hearing and discussion, the Proposed Budget was adopted for expenditures in the following amounts: General

Electric Department — \$53,520. Total Expenditures — \$95,718.

A tax rate of \$16.00 per thousand was adopted which is an increase of \$2 per thousand over previous budgets.

In other action, Mayor Kilbane appointed Frederick Middaugh as Chief of Police.

Richard Schrader, President of the Andover Volunteer Fire Co., presented the list of Officers for the coming year with them being duly approved by the Village Board.

It was also approved to purchase the materials necessary for the new 800 amp Electric Service for the Andover Dairies. Building Permits were approved for 2 new homes to be built this summer as well as for the enclosure of a Patio.

These permits are: Herbert Leonard to build a new home on Fuller St.; Oliver Kemp to build a new home on Dyke St.; and Charles Gavin to enclose a patio on Fairview St.

A resolution was adopted to participate in the joint Summer Youth Program with the Town Board and School Board, and to make application for State Aid for 50% of the cost.

Regular Monthly Reports were given by the heads of each Department with instructions being issued for the ensuing month, and regular bills audited and ordered paid.
