Gail Burdick To Receive Empire Farmer Award

Gail Eugene Burdick, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Burdick, R. D. 1, Andover, will receive the highest award given to a Future Farmer by the New York Association of F. F. A., at the 40th Convention to be held at the Walton High School, May 7 and 8.

The Empire Farmer Degree is awarded annually to two per cent of the State F. F. A. enrollment. This year about one hundred forty boys will receive the award. To be eligible for this award a boy must have completed four units of agriculture, have invested at least \$500 in farming, and be a leader in school and community activities.

Gail's supervised Farming Program consists of a farm partnership with his father. They are milking twenty-three cows and working 285 acres of land.

Gail has been President, Vice-President, Sentinel and Secretary of the Andover Chapter of the F. F. A. He has taken an active interest in school affairs participating in the Junior and Senior Play activities. He plans on working the home farm with his father after graduation from high school.
