To be eligible for this award, a boy must have completed four units of agriculture, have invested at least \$500 in farming, and be a lender in school and community activities.

Gail's supervised Farming Program consists of a farm partner-ship with his father. They are milking twenty-three cows and

working 285 acres of land.
