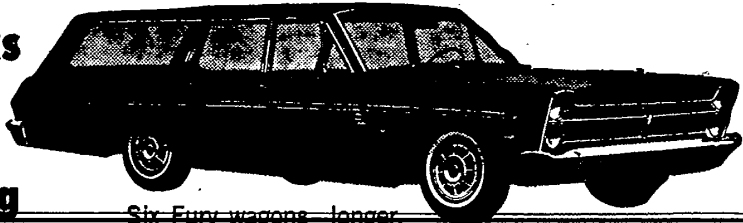
Clinton York was hired as head custodian to begin his duties on May 1st.

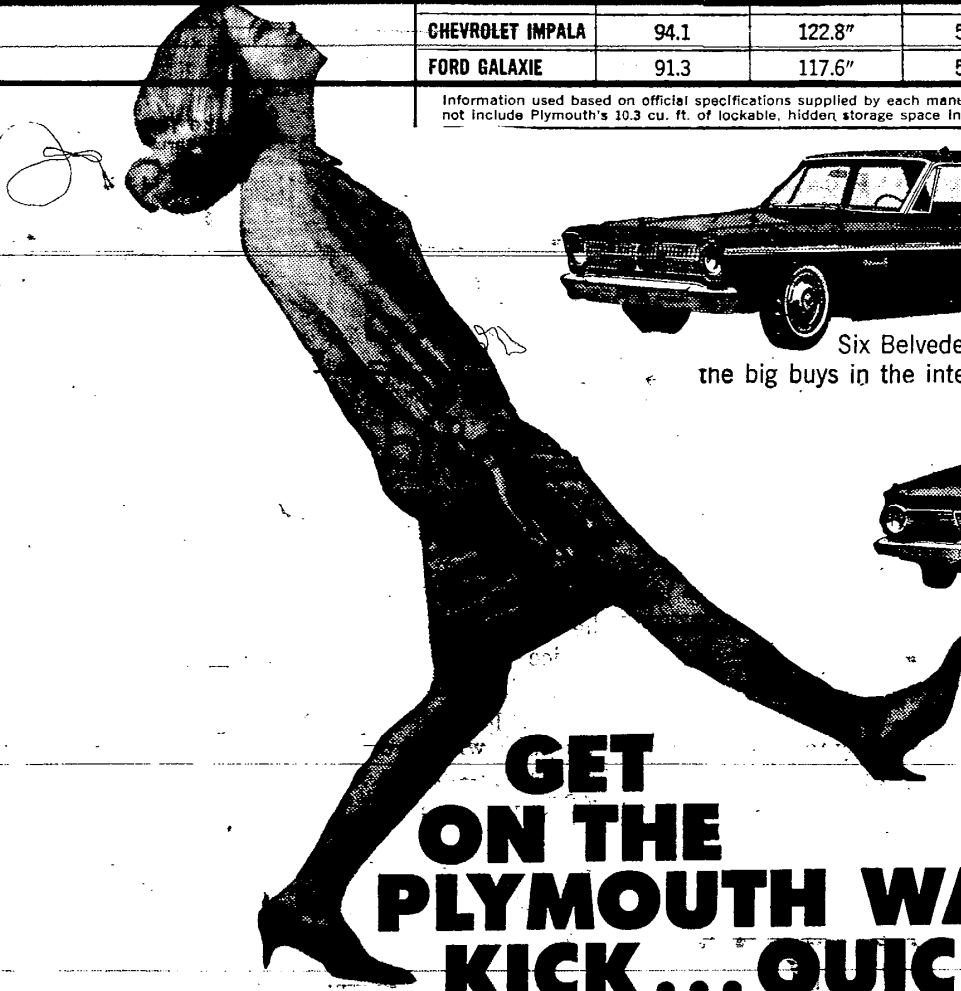
