Oppose Plan For Zoning In Town Of Alfred

Residents of the Town of Alfred have voiced strong disapproval of a proposal to establish a zoning ordinance in the township which includes the communities of Alfred Station and Alfred.

Sixty-two persons residing in the area attended a public meeting on the issue at the Alfred Station Fire House and named Charles Burdick as chairman of a committee to oppose the proposal.

The committee was delegated by the group to draw up and circulate a petition stating that a zoning ordinance would "be detrimental to business and industrial expansion".

The following are some of the reasons why this committee are against the zoning ordinance:

1. Won't change any existing conditions which some of the public have complained about.

3. Discourages business and industry.

4. Topography and soil conditions are not such in the Town of Alfred that they would need a zoning ordinance.

5. Discourages residential development on account of limited available lots that meet zoning specifications.

6. It would be detrimental to any expansion. That in turn would decrease land values and would raise your taxes.

The proposed ordinance for zoning of the community lists these reasons, among others, for establishment of such an ordinance: "It would lessen congestion on highways, promote the general welfare of the community and prevent the overcrowding of land." These factors were all disputed by the group at last Thursday evening's meeting.

Others named to the committee selected to oppose the zoning plan are Douglas Burdick, secretary treasurer; and Franklin Stevens and Roland Gardner. Attorney Richard Tolins of Alfred has been engaged as counsel for the group.
