### Chauffeurs License Expire May 31st

Some 100,000 of New York State's licensed chauffeurs must renew their licenses this month, Motor Vehicle Commissioner William S. Hults has pointed out.

The 100,000 licenses are due to expire on May 31, and renewal applications, pre-printed in Albany by the Data Processing Division of the Department of Motor Vehicles, were mailed last week to those eligible to continue holding the licenses.

Some of these licensees will be required to pass a vision test on this renewal—approximately one-third—or proved proof in the form of a certificate from their own physician, ophthalmologist, oculist or optometrist testifying that they have 20/40 vision in one or both eyes with or without corrective lenses. Notification of this requirement is stamped on the application.

Commissioner Hults urged chauffeurs to check the expiration date of their own licenses to see whether they are among this group. If such is the case and they do not receive the punch card renewal application by May 15, they are asked to contact their nearest Motor Vehicle office immediately.

### Andover Telephone To Have Additional Dial Switching Equipment

Loquax Telephone Corporation announces that a contract has been let to the Stromberg-Carlson Company covering the installation of additional Central office dial switching equipment at Andover. The project will allow the telephone company to double the number of Andover Alfred E.A.B. trunks. The work will also enable the company to provide more one party telephone lines in the Andover area. It is estimated that the work will be completed in approximately ninety days.

The additional equipment is necessary because of the continued telephone growth. There are now over 2500 telephones in the Allegany district compared to 1700 ten years ago.
