MOTHER'S DAY

Mother's Day is not something which has always existed. In fact, the tradition of this recognition of Mothers is less than sixty years old.

Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia is the one credited with the origination of this day. Miss Jarvis' mother died in 1906. The next year, Miss Jarvis mentioned to some friends who had gathered in memory of her mother, that she would like to set aside a day for all mothers. Soon she had interested many individuals and organizations and the second Sunday in May was set aside for the observance of Mother's Day. May 10, 1908 marks the date of the first official Mother's Day celebrated in Philadelphia.

Miss Jarvis then became a missionary of the idea and traveled about the United States in hope of spreading her idea. State after State adopted this observance. Texas observes the day by pardoning a number of prisoners.

It was not until May 10, 1913 (had a resolution passed the Senate and House of Representatives to make the second Sunday in May a National Holiday "dedicated to the memory of the best Mother in the world, — your Mother".

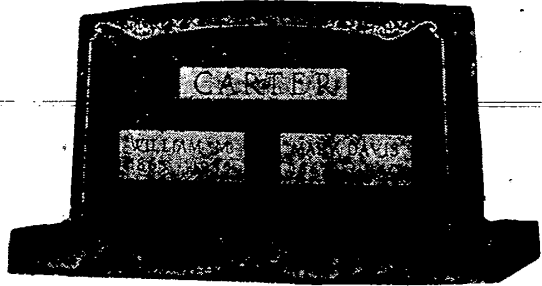
