A one-car accident around 8 A. M, this morning on Route 17 in front of the Lynn Matison home a short distance West from the Andover Village Dump, hospital-ized the youthful driver and her father and from appearances, totally demolished the auto she

was driving.

Greenwood, driver of the car suspossible back injuries; her father Jennings B. Ford, 65, same address, and owner of the car, received a broken clavicle and multiple back of the car. iple lacerations, with both of them being listed in fair condition according to authorities at the St James Mercy Hospital in Hornell while Mrs. Betty Ford, the girl's mother and passenger in the rear seat of the ill fated vehicle, was not admitted to the hospital altwo members of her family in the James B. Mulholland Ambulance.

Miss Ford and her family had dropped Roderick C. Ford, 21, off at the Bulk-Tainer Plant in Andover where he is employed and were proceeding West on Route 17 towards Wellsville when the accident occurred.

The youthful driver passed an Andover Central School bus driven by Oliver Kemp, cut in sharply in front of the bus when an oncomgront of the bus when an oncom-ing car was observed approaching, lost control of her car, skidded across the road, rolled over the embankment on the South side of the road with the car ending up on its top in the field bordering the highway.

According to Oliver Kemp, School Bus Supervisor and driver of the bus, the driver of the car cut in sharply directly in front of him, apparently lost control of the vehicle as it careened back and forth several times before it skidded sideways across the highand forth several times before it skidded sideways across the highway after turning half way around on the loose dirt along the right shoulder of the road, and then rolled over as it went down over the 12 foot embankment with the doors opening up and flapping wildly.

Mr. Keinp told us in an interview this morning that he immediately stopped the empty School Bus and rushed to the scene to assist the victims. Due to the extensive damage to the car, it was rather difficult to get Mr. and Mrs. Ford from the wreckage but since they were both conscious, the task was made a little easier without causing further injuries.

He then directed Mr. Matison to phone for an ambulance and notify

According to the State Trooper investigating the accident Miss Ford had just been issued her driver's learners permit so her in-experience at the wheel could ac-count for the accident since the count for the accident since the weather was clear.
