## Special Village Board Meeting Held Thursday

A Special Village Board Meeting was held Thursday night, May 27th, 1965, with Mayor Paul Kilbane calling it to order at 9 p. m. and all Trustees present except Robert Baker.

A complaint was entered by Herman Wallace about dirty water which is damaging appliances as well as hot water tanks every time there is a rain-fall. Mr. Wallace presented a qt. jar that was collected May 5th at 10:15 P. M., and another jar that was collected May 27th at 1:30 P. M. containing dirty water taken out of the tap at his residence. He stated that he was having a private filter system installed in his home at the approximate cost of \$40 - \$50 to try and protect his hot water tank and appliances and offered to keep track of how soon the filter needed changing. He also invited the Board to inspect the water filter when it was dirty as well as to look over the filtering system.

The Board asked if Cahill checked the Springs when there was a storm and were assured that he did. Mayor Kilbane asked permission to attend the next Town Board Meeting to see what could be done to correct this situation, with a motion made and carried to this effect. Also it was decided to contact a firm of experts to find out what the cost would be to have them come in and correct the cause of the dirty water situation.

A motion was made and carried to add \$691 in delinquent water bills to the taxes of those concerned. In other action, motions were made and carried for Landis Kibbe to contact Mrs. Elmo Barden for the job of Deputy Clerk; and for Mayor Kilbane to contact Cecil Clark about the job as janitor at the Village Office, with \$10 per month quoted as having been paid in the past for having the office cleaned once a week.

A complaint was reported from Mahlon Mitchell that the Village Crew did not remove the residue from cleaning out the ditch but instead left it along the edge. A
