Given in marriage by her father the bride wore a floor-length gown of pastel pink organza over taffeta. The princess-style dress featured a scoop neckline, long tapered sleeves and a bustle in the back. Pearl embroidery accented the front. Her shoulder-length pink illusion veil was attached to a regal crown of seed pearls and she carried a lace covered Bible adorned with a cascade bouquet of white carnations and lilies-of-the-valley centered with a white orchid. Her only jewelry was a single strand of pearls, gift of the groom.
