cool Sunday afternoon at the Horneil Raceway, the racing fans saw a really hot program ending up with the best Demolition Derby that we have seen in ages with 14 cars in the line-up.

In one of the Modern heats, Paul Hideck, No. 6-7/8, won a close contest, with Warren Kinney, No. 16, really breathing down his neck in the last few laps and just waiting for Paul to pull a mis-cue so he could pass him.

In the Novice "Consy", Levi Henry, No. 409, went over the bank between the No. 3 and No. 4 turns which made a re-start of the race necessary. Luckily he wasn't hurt, and as soon as his crew made some minor repairs to the car, was back out on the track.

In the Novice Feature, Howie Slocum, No. 148, had the race all sewed up as he was leading the field by at least half a lap, when his car spun out on the No. 1 turn and stalled which forced him to bail out and watch the rest of the race from the infield. A crack-up on the back-stretch between No. 11, Bill Deming, and the lead car No. 218, Don Chalmers, in the next to last lap resulted in the race being called ended as of the previous lap, with No. 218 the winner.

In the Modern Feature—a crack up on the back-stretch on the 1st lap made a re-start necessary, although not much damage was done to the cars involved. After the re-start, a torrid battle ensued with Paul Hideck, No. 6-7/8, finally managing to work his way out into the lead, closely followed by Warren Kinney, No. 16. Meanwhile another battle was going on between Basil Schutt, No. 13, Eddie Fay, No. 15X, Bud Perkins No. 57, and Jim Quant, No. OK, with Jim having the misfortune of having his accelerator pedal stick as he was going into the No. 3 turn which sent him flying over the bank between the No. 3 and No. 4 turn. According to spectators who saw his car after it left the track, it went end over end and then rolled over several times with parts flying every which way. Fortunately in one respect, his safety equipment kept him in the car and saved him from receiving any more serious injuries than those sustained. He was immediately rushed to the St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell where he was reported in fair condition suffering from a possible neck fracture as well as the loss of some of his front teeth.

When the race was re-started Bill Layfield, with his '65 Buick Skylark, No. 121, pulled into line

at the rear of the pack and put his new car thru its paces for the benefit of the spectators and to get the "feel of the track" for future events.

**Notice of School Meeting Andover Central School**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the annual meeting of the inhabitants of Central School District No. 1 of Andover, Allegany County, qualified to vote at school meeting in said district will be held at the schoolhouse in said district on Tuesday, July 13 1965 at 8:00 o'clock p. m., for the transaction of such business as is authorized by the Education Law.

And notice is also given that a copy of the statement of the amount of money which will be required for the ensuing year for school purposes exclusive of public monies, may be obtained by any taxpayer in the said district during the seven days immediately preceding the annual meeting except Saturday, Sunday or holiday at each of the following schoolhouses in which school is maintained during the hours designated.

Andover Central School, 9 - 12 a. m., and 1 - 4 p. m.

And notice is also given that petitions nominating candidates for the office of member of the board of education must be filed with the clerk of the district not later than June 29, 1965.

The following vacancies are to be filled on the Board of Education:

Term: Five years (Name of last incumbent: Robert Common) Each vacancy requires a separate petition to nominate a candidate to each separate office. Each petition must be directed to the clerk of the district, must be signed by at least twenty-five qualified voters of the district,

must state the name and residence of the candidate and must describe the specific vacancy for which the candidate is nominated including at least the length of the term of office and the names of the last incumbent.

Also vote on the following Resolution:

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of Central School District, No. 1, Towns of Andover, Alfred, Wellsville, Independence, and Ward, Allegany County; and Greenwood, Steuben County; is hereby authorized and directed to purchase one school bus and expend therefor a gross sum not exceeding \$10,200.00, and that there shall be applied to the purchase any trade-in allowance to be received for a bus now owned by the school district, and that the afore said total sum of \$10,200.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by tax on the taxable property of the school district to be collected in annual installments; and further resolved that the Board of Education is authorized to issue obligations of the district therefor in accordance with the Education Law and Local Finance Law.


