Allegany County Sheriff Urges Boating Safety

Boating safety is everybody's boating season already looking like a record-breaker, common sense

and courtesy on the water is necessary, if tragic accidents are to he averted.
Here are a few safety tips from Vananna Jones, Sheriff of Allegany County. New York:

Andover, N. Y., June 17, 1965

"New York State law requires that all mechanically propelled boats operated in State waters must be equipped with at least one life preserver or other approved life saving device for each person aboard. Play it safe—safety-equip your boat."

"Don't ever overload your boat. Carry no more then the number of passengers the boat is built to accommodate. Boating is fun Help keep it that way by carefully

accommodate. Boating is fun Help keep it that way by carefully observing the safety rules."

"A trim 'loat is a safe boat. Distribute the weight of passengers and cargo evenly. When you're underway, sit still in the boat. Avoid changing positions while underway."

"New York State's Navigation Law requires that all boats shall be operated in a careful and prudent manner. Don't let an accident ruin your boating fun. Obey the rules of boating safety."

"For safety sake, you must carry certain equipment in your boat — a suitable anchor, whist and a United States Coast Guardapproved life preserver, jacket vest, of buoyant cushion for each person aboard. See that your boat contains the required safety equipment."

"Boating accidents do happen.

"Boating accidents do happen.
In Now York State, boating accidents in which a person is injured, or there is more than 25 dollars

worth of property damage, must be reported to the State Division of Motor Boats. Failure to comply may be punishable by a fine of up to 100 dollars."

"The Navigation Law requires that there be two persons in a boat which is towing a water skier. The observer must be at least 10 years of age. Water skiing is prohibited from one hour after sunset to one hour after sunrise."

"Signals are as important to the

"Signals are as important to the boatman on the water as they are to the motorist on the highway. When boating, signal your intensions. Let your fellow boatman know where you are, and what you intend to do. It may save your

boat, and your life."

"If your boat should capsize, stay with it. It is far safer to hang on to the boat until help comes, than to try to swim to shore."

"Don't try to outsmart the weather. Keep a weather eye "peeled" for the storm signals. If you're on land when you see them, stay there, and if you're on the water, get to shore as quickly as possible."


