**Boating Rules Of The Road Important Says Sheriff Jones**

For years the words preparedness, caution and safety, have been bywords with all things nautical, sheriff Yanama Jones of Allegany County noted today. Neglect and unsafe shipboard practices can lead to a disaster on the water, loss of a boat and of human lives.

Many persons, comparatively new to boating, compare the operation of their boats to that of their automobiles. Actually, these vehicles have very little in common. The automobile driver of today receives constant instruction in the form of road signs while his vehicle is in operation.

But there are no road signs or traffic signals on the water, and the direction a boatman chooses to travel is only restricted by the depth of the water.

However, there are rules governing the operation of boats, and when common sense is added, the application of these rules helps prevent accidents and save lives.

The following "Rules of the Road" should be known and applied by every boatman in New York State:

1. In crossing situations, the boat to starboard (right side) has the right of way and must hold course and speed. The burdened vessel must keep clear, and pass astern of the privileged vessel.
2. In meeting head-on, both vessels must turn to starboard (right) and pass port to port. The signal in this situation is one blast or the whistle initiated by either boat, and answered with one blast by the other craft.

When vessels are already far enough to starboard (right) of each other so that they are not meeting head-on, either boat shall initiate a two-blast signal. The other boat shall answer with two blasts, and the boats shall pass starboard to starboard (no course change necessary).

3. In passing situation, the boat being overtaken has the right of way. The overtaking vessel signals with one blast of the whistle for passing on starboard (right) side of the boat ahead, or two blasts for passing on the port (left) side of the boat ahead. If the overtaken vessel answers with like signal, the other boat may pass. If the overtaken vessel sounds the danger signal, the overtaking vessel may not pass until such time as the overtaken craft initiates appropriate passing signals.

4. In fog or other types of reduced visibility, travel at reduced speed and sound one long blast of the whistle every minute. When towing under similar circumstances, sound one long and two short blasts. When anchoring in fog, ring bell or other warning signal for about five seconds each minute.

5. Sailing craft have the right of way over mechanically propelled vessels, except when the sailing vessel is overtaking the mechanically propelled vessel.

6. Every operator must strictly abide by the rules. However, when immediate danger exists, the operator shall, if necessary, depart from the rules to the extent necessary to avoid collision.

"Rules of the Road" apply to the small pleasure craft, as well as the large commercial ships, such as, ocean liners or freighters. However, the large vessel with her great length and tremendous weight cannot maneuver as easily as the smaller pleasure vessel.

Her turning circle is large, her stopping distance is relatively great, and she must stay within channel courses because of her deep draft. Always give such vessels a wide berth.
