56 Fairs In State Foresee Prospects Of Good Season

The Trumansburg Fair in Tompkins County kicks off the regular season on July 6. From then on without a break for 10 weeks, the fairs will run day and night until they drop the curtain on September 11 when the Dundee Fair closes.


