Center in Steuben County should remain open. The V. A. was ordered to implement the recommendations of the independent committee named by the President. That committee, recognizing the great value of the Center, had urged that Bath be maintained. The committee was appointed by the President after the President himself read the hearings in which many of us testified before the House Veterans Committee. The President said those hearings created some doubt in his mind.

Because of its geographical position, this Center is of immense value to the entire 38th Congressional District. #### **Drivers No Longer** Able To Forfeit Bail

Able 10 Forfeit Bail

Albany, N. Y., June 22, 1965—
Drivers convicted of speeding in

New York State may no longer
rely on forfeiting bail in order to
avoid either a notation on their
operator's license or, in aggrevated
cases, the loss of driving privileges.

This was the reaction of State
Comptroller Arthur Levitt today
in expressing satisfaction over the
passage of an amendment to the

Vehicle and Traffic law clarifying the disposition of fines and forfeitures.

The bill, prepared by the Comp-

The bill, prepared by the Comptroller, was jointly sponsored by him and the Commissioner of the Department of Motor Vehicles.

The amendment primarily concerns the disposition of bail forfeitures. Under the old law, the return of bail forfeitures was not limited by population. This ledame villages to impose bail forfeitures in lieu of appropriate fines in order to avoid the per-

capita limitation upon reimbursement of certain fines.

"This law will climinate those procedures," said the Comptroller.




