Mayor Announces Plans To Improve Water System

At Village Board Meeting

Mayor Paul Kilbane announced Tuesday night at the regular Village Board Meeting that plans have been made to improve, and possibly clear up entirely, the murky water situation that has been occurring in the Village Water System after a rain-fall.

Mayor Kilbane reported that all Village Board Members except Bob Baker met with Fay Boyd and Frank Cahill, together with Arthur Black, Licensed Professional Engineer, and James Waterman, Water Consultant, to take a tour of the Village Spring Area Saturday morning in an effort to find out how the silt, etc., was getting into the Village Water System.

Fay Boyd, former Superintendent of the Village Water and Street Dept., made several observations and suggestions which were endorsed by the two Professional Consultants, Mr. Black and Mr. Waterman.

The water was tested at both the springs and at the reservoir with the following analysis:

At the Springs: 3 grains per gallon—hardness of the water.
Iron — 0.35 parts per million.
Ph factor of 6.3, which is slightly acidic, with no sulfur.

At the Well: 6 grains per gallon hardness of the water.
Iron — .3 parts per million.

(Ed. note—Chemically speaking, any Ph reading below 7 is acidic and anything above 7 is alkaline.)

Mr. Black and Mr. Waterman stated that this was an almost perfect balance between the Spring Water and Well Water in the Village reservoir, although neither Ph reading from either source would affect the potability of the drinking water. These gentlemen felt that if the catch basins were fixed up properly and maintained, the murky water condition would be pretty well cleared up.

However, in the event that these improvements do not solve the problem, these two consultants are going to find out any pertinent information necessary about a filter installation and report back to Village Officials.

The following statistics about the Village Water System were also brought out:

Elevation of the Springs — 1,960 feet.
Elevation of top of hill that water is siphoned over—1,935 ft.
Elevation at low point on Chestnut St. — 1,850 feet.
Elevation at reservoir—1,805 ft.
Average water pressure—85 lbs. per sq. in.

No Serious Injuries In 2-Car Collision

No serious injuries resulted from a 2-car collision on Route 17 at the Norbert Lynch driveway, near the Andover Village limits, when a car driven by Chester Klosowski from Buffalo, collided with a car driven by Rev. John R. Shea of Andover.

According to both drivers, Mr. Klosowski was traveling West on Route 17 when his car collided with Father Shea's car which was traveling East and was turning into the Norbert Lynch driveway around noon, on Wednesday, July 14th.

Three of the McCormick children, Charlene, age 11, Shawn, 8, and Terry, 6 were passengers in the Shea auto and were taken to Dr. Scott for treatment for cuts received from broken glass from the right rear door window. After receiving emergency treatment, the children were able to return to their home.

Both vehicles were towed from the scene of the accident after State Troopers from the Wellsville Station completed their investigation.

News That's Print To Fit

Parents, Do You Realize That: A change in the New York State Vehicle and Traffic Law, passed at the recent session of Legislature, requires that all bicycles ridden during the hours of darkness be equipped with a red reflector, three inches in diameter, on the rear of the bicycle.

The reflector must be of a type approved by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles and which can be seen up to 300 feet to the rear when directly in front of the upper beams of a motor vehicle's headlights. The hours of darkness are between one-half hour before sunset and one-half hour before sunrise.

The bicycle may be equipped with a red light in addition to the reflector.

We are glad to hear that the Village Board has called in a couple of experts and is doing something in an effort to stop the muddy water in the Village Water System.

In talking with Mr. Waterman last night, we were told that this condition would probably not be able to be cleared up overnight but would be improved gradually as work progressed. We also asked him how come there was more chlorine in the water and he answered that the State has raised the amount to be added in all Municipal Water Systems — so that explains that.

In case anyone should feel that some one else has sold us a bill of goods on this report — we are paying a qualified expert for his findings and observations and have no cause to doubt the veracity of his findings and are reporting them as given to us. 10-4"

Here we go again! It is not beyond the realm of possibility that the ownership of such trash can be traced back to the responsible persons, with them being subject to a good sized fine as well as paying claims on any justified complaints.

Let's see it that we all help enforce these laws so that such a despicable practice can be completely stopped.
