

Check Weather Before Boating, Sheriff Advises

Sheriff Vanama Jones of Allegany County, today reminded boat owners that it pays to check weather conditions before and during a cruise.

Here are a few weather rules for safe boating from a U. S. Department of Commerce, Weather Bureau:

Always be cautious when you see Red Pennant displayed. This pennant, a "Small Craft Warning", means that winds up to 38 miles per hour or sea conditions affecting the safe operation of small boats are forecast.

The "Small Craft Warning", as well as "Gale," "Whole Gale," and "Hurricane" warning signals and displayed at U. S. Coast Guard stations, Yacht Clubs, marines and at other points along the coast.

Before setting out on a cruise a boatman should check local weather and sea conditions, obtain the latest weather forecast and make certain that no warnings are displayed.

While afloat, he should keep on the lookout for weather signs. For instance, the approach of dark, threatening clouds may foretell a squall or thunderstorm.

A boatman should also be on the alert for any steady increase in wind force, or the height of sea waves, or both. An increase in wind velocity, opposite in direction to a strong tidal current, may create a dangerous "rip" tide condition with low but steep waves capable of swamping a small boat.

Threatening weather usually shows up on the barometer — an instrument used to measure the change in air pressure. If the barometer reading is rising, fair weather is usually ahead.

Weather forecasts for coastal and boating areas are issued every six hours. When a warning is issued, the forecasts also contain a statement where "Small Craft," "Gale," "Whole Gale," or "Hurricane" warnings are displayed. However, warnings of approaching storms may be issued at any time of the day or night.

Information as to locations of coastal warning display stations and all radio stations in New York State making broadcasts of U. S. Weather Bureau, coastal forecasts and warnings, together with their schedules, are published on a series of Coastal Warning Facilities Chart, editions issued annually. Charts covering New York State areas include: Eastport, Maine to Montauk Point, New York; Montauk Point, New York to Manasquan, New Jersey, and the Great Lakes, Erie, Huron and Ontario. Copies of these charts may be obtained from the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington 25 D. C., at 16 cents each.
