Boost Your Home Town

Sheriff Gives Tips For Safe Boating

Before getting underway, a good boatman will be sure he knows his boat, its machinery and its operation, said Sheriff Vanama Jones of Allegany County Sheriff's Department.

Before getting underway, he will check the weather, check his fuel supply to be sure he has enough for the round trip, and see that all gear is properly stowed. Most important, he will let some one know where he is going, said the Sheriff.

He won't overload his boat. He'll keep the load low, and distribute it evenly in the boat. And he won't allow anyone to stand up in a small boat.

When leaving the dock, a good boatman will take in all lines and shove the boat well out away from the dock, to allow room for heading away. He won't make the mistake of slamming his stern into the docks by not giving himself sufficient room to maneuver.

When the wind and current pushing the boat against the dock, it may be necessary to push the stern out and then reverse the engine, thus backing into the clear.

Improper fueling practices cause a large number of accidents. Common sense and care can help prevent most of these.

Fueling should be done in the daytime whenever possible. If a boat must be fueled at night, only electric lights should be used, never open flames.

Whenever a boat is moored at a fueling dock, be careful of sparks. Don't smoke, strike matches or throw switches. Stop all engines, motors, fans or other devices that may produce sparks, and put out all lights and galley fires.

Before starting to fuel, close all ports, windows, doors, hatches, and check the condition of fuel tank vents, connections and flame cones.

During fueling, keep the nozzle of the hose or can in contact with fill opening to guard against possible static sparks, and see that no fuel spills get below. After fueling is completed, close fill opening, and wipe up all spilled fuel.

Open all ports, windows, doors and hatches, permit boat to ventilate for at least five minutes and see that there is no odor of gasoline in the bilges or below deck spaces before starting machinery or lighting fires.

If a boat overturns, passengers should not try to swim for shore. They should grab a life preserver swim to the boat and hold on until help arrives.
