Sales Tax Must Be Collected

If Goods Or Services

Subject To It
Albany, July 30 — State Tax
Commissioner Jesseh H. Murphy
today reminded all persons who
expect to sell goeds or services
subject to the New York State and local sales and use tax after August 1 that they must collect the tax even though they may not have received their Certificate of Authority from the Tax Department.

He urged those merchants and the have not regis-He uiged those merchants and businessmen who have not registered as vendors with the State Sales Tax Bureau to do so through their State District Tax Offices at once, even though they may have been registered as vendors in a local sales tax jurisdiction.

"The Sales Tax Bureau has been processing Certificates of Registration and Authority as quickly as possible", he said. "However some vendors will not have received their validated Certificates of Authority by August 1."

Even though a vendor of taxable goods and services does not have his Certificate of Authority he is required to begin collecting

Albany, N. Y., August 1, 1965—"On this, the effective date of the 2% Statewide sales tax, I would like to assure the public that each passing day brings—usone day closer to the repeal of this onerous measure", State Comptroller Arthur Levitt said today.

Mr. Levitt said he would cor-Mr. Levitt said he would continue working for repeal "actively" with Legislators of both parties "immediately foilowing the November election by indicating areas where expenditures can be cut without danger to programs and alternative revenues which will ease the burden on the tax-payer of small means".

The Comptroller, who made an

The Comptroller, who made an early stand against the Administration's revenue measure which won passage in the 1965 Session of the Lagislating most won passage in the 1965 Session of the Legislature, most recently called for the repeal of the tax Tuesday afternoon before the Democratic State Committee in New York City, saying "we must see to it that the obnoxious sales tax, hitting hardest at the people least able to pay, is repealed.' Comptroller Levitt said that more equitable systems of taxation could be substituted to provide the necessary revenues to operate State government. He had offered three alternatives to the Legislature during the past Session.

"In New York City, where there is already a three per cent sales tax in effect, millions of people will be spending five cents of each dollar in sales tax for most goods and services beginning tomorrow. A great many of these people can ill afford this imposition," said the

This has been the pattern in other states. During the period since 1960, thirteen states have increased the bases of their sales taxes. This year four more gov-ernors asked for similar increases. "As the State's Chief Fiscal Of-"As the State's Chief Fiscal Officer, I will be watching the conficer, I will be watching the sales tax estimated by the Administration at \$12 million annually, utilizing 850 new employees. This may prove an underestimate. My auditors will continue to seek the significant savings and efficiency they have found in the past.

"Responsible economists maintain that the sales tax is levied when no other practical alternatives are available. This year submitted to the Legislature three detailed studies which outlined practical alternatives of revenue sources. But rather than accept these, the Governor pushed ahead with the sales tax.
