

Sales Tax Must Be Collected

If Goods Or Services Subject To It

Albany, July 30 — State Tax Commissioner Joseph H. Murphy today reminded all persons who expect to sell goods or services subject to the New York State and local sales and use tax after August 1 that they must collect the tax even though they may not have received their Certificate of Authority from the Tax Department.

He urged those merchants and businessmen who have not registered as vendors with the State Sales Tax Bureau to do so through their State District Tax Offices at once, even though they may have been registered as vendors in a local sales tax jurisdiction.

"The Sales Tax Bureau has been processing Certificates of Registration and Authority as quickly as possible," he said. "However some vendors will not have received their validated Certificates of Authority by August 1."

Even though a vendor of taxable goods and services does not have his Certificate of Authority he is required to begin collecting the State and local sales tax—2% State tax plus the prevailing local tax rate—beginning August 1. Records must be kept of the amount of tax collected and a Sales Tax return for the month of August must be filed with the Sales Tax Bureau.

The two-part card Certificate of Registration and Authority can be obtained at any State District Tax Office or at the Sales Tax Bureau, State Campus, Albany, New York 12226.

Beginning Monday, August 2, Commissioner Murphy said, State Tax Department representatives will make spot checks of business establishments in all areas of the State to see whether Certificate of Authority have been received and are displayed in plain view. Where help is needed with registration, vendors will receive it.

Bouquets of flowers presented to John included a huge basket of mums from the businessmen that sponsored the congratulations and also baskets from the Citizens National Bank and Employees, the Market Basket, Harry and Kate Joyce, Aronson Machine Co., Dodd and Fanny Lehman, and Francis and Sadie Vickers. This week ushered in a new era in New York State history when Merchants started in collecting the Sales and Use Tax—while the poor overburdened Taxpayers had to cough up extra pennies for their purchases.

We have been opposed to the Sales and Use Tax since it was first proposed because it would hit big business and real estate dealers, it sure is bound to hit hardest at the older retired persons on fixed income and the poorer people that have large families. Thus we were glad to see the following News Release and pass it along for our readers information and subsequent action:

Albany, N. Y., August 1, 1965 —"On this, the effective date of the 2% Statewide sales tax, I would like to assure the public that each passing day brings us one day closer to the repeal of this onerous measure", State Comptroller Arthur Levitt said today.

Mr. Levitt said he would continue working for repeal "actively" with Legislators of both parties "immediately following the November election by indicating areas where expenditures can be cut without danger to programs and alternative revenues which will ease the burden on the taxpayer of small means".

The Comptroller, who made an early stand against the Administration's revenue measure which won passage in the 1965 Session of the Legislature, most recently called for the repeal of the tax Tuesday afternoon before the Democratic State Committee in New York City, saying "we must see to it that the obnoxious sales tax, hitting hardest at the people least able to pay, is repealed."

Comptroller Levitt said that more equitable systems of taxation could be substituted to provide the necessary revenues to operate State government. He had offered three alternatives to the Legislature during the past Session.

"In New York City, where there is already a three per cent sales tax in effect, millions of people will be spending five cents of each dollar in sales tax for most goods and services beginning tomorrow. A great many of these people can ill afford this imposition," said the Comptroller.

County Ponds Stocked

Carl Burdick of Andover, N. Y. reports that the County Reforestation Committee has stocked six of the reforestation ponds with bass. They should reproduce in a couple of years and make some mighty good bass fishing.

"We must guard against its pitfalls. Easy money leads to easy spending. Next year, it will yield at least \$200 million more than it will this year during its five-month tenure when an estimated \$330 million will be collected. But this is only a beginning. I predict that in future years there will be demands from the executive office that the sales tax be increased.

This has been the pattern in other states. During the period since 1960, thirteen states have increased the bases of their sales taxes. This year four more governors asked for similar increases.

"As the State's Chief Fiscal Officer, I will be watching the cost of administering the sales tax estimated by the Administration at \$12 million annually, utilizing 850 new employees. This may prove an underestimate. My auditors will continue to seek the significant savings and efficiency they have found in the past.

"Responsible economists maintain that the sales tax is levied when no other practical alternatives are available. This year submitted to the Legislature three detailed studies which outlined practical alternatives of revenue sources. But rather than accept these, the Governor pushed ahead with the sales tax.

"As I have done in the past, I will continue to propose effective economy measures and efficient methods of revenue gathering source to the Legislature in hopes that the public faith in the efficiency of governmental operations may be restored."
