The Sales Tax And Your Municipal Electric Department

Under the recently enacted New Under the recently enacted New York State Tax Act we are liable for the collection of the 2% Sales and Use Tax, therefore we will add such tax on the electricity consumed effective Angust 1, 1965. The first such billing will appear on the September 10 bills.

ARC Warns On Holding Breath Under Water

Three recent fatalities from "hyperventilation," and becoming unconscious from holding the breath under water, have pointed to the danger of this action.

Mrs. Leon Coffin, Allegany Co. Red Cross Chair aan, was especially emphatic in her warning to children who compete with each other, to see who can stay under water the longest.

"Before going under water, a. in dividual takes several deep breath in order to build up as much oxygen as possible in his lungs. This deep breathing ca'led by ventilation does increase the oxygen at the same time it lowers the carbon dioxide in the system.
