July Rainfall

Rainfall at Belmont, N. Y., for the month of July 1965 according to the Soil Conservation Service technicians was 3.36". This is considerably more rainfall than many areas of Allegany County received. This also is more rainfall than many parts of New York State experienced.

The growing season rainfall at Belmont was 10.88" from April through July. This is 5" below the five year average from 1960-1965. This, coupled with a 3 year below average rainfall, has reduced the potential supply of water available for crop production and also underground water reserves.
