NYACK VOLUNTEER CHOSEN FIREMAN OF THE YEAR



HERO HONORED — Donald H. Price of Nyack, commissioner of the Nyack Fire Patrol, receives the coveted Schenley Bowl for Heroism awarded annually to New York's volunteer Fireman of the Year at the 93rd annual convention of the 250,000-member Firemen's Association of the State of New York in Utica. Making the presentation is Paul R. Lockwood, vice president of Schenley Industries, Inc., which has awarded the Bowl annually since 1957. Despite intense smoke and flames, volunteer hero Price found two unconscious children in a burning Nyack basement spartment and, guided by voice directions because the smoke obscured his vision, managed to hand them out through a window. Mr. Price applied mouth-to-mouth resuscitation to one of the children until resuscitator equipment arrived and, after treatment for his own burns, remained at the scene and helped with the salvage work.
