However, they give great care and much time to their woodland management program which includes promoting the best growth of desirable species, eliminating weed species from the woodlot, control of erosion from roadways and proferosion f erosion from roadways and proof erosion from roadways and providing of an environment for the best growth of maple sugar bush and other valuable hardwood species. The main trees on the Burdick woodland are maple, ash, cherry and basswood. There are a few oaks. The two men keep an "eagle eye" out for undesirable trees and are continually planning future stands.
