No Special Pre-Season Bear Hunting

New York's bruins have been behaving themselves this summer and as a result will have an additional ten days to roam the woods without getting shot at.

Last year, and in 1963, the Conservation Department scheduled a special 10-day early bear season to help reduce the nuisance problems caused by hears scavenging

to help reduce the nuisance prob-lems caused by bears scavenging near populated areas. With dam-age complaints at a minimum this summer, the Department has an nounced that no special pre-season bear hunt will be held. "Complaints of bear vandalism have been fewer than in previous years," said Raiph B. Colson, Chief of the Department's Bureau of Game. "It appears that good sup-plies of native foods have kept the bears well fed and well manner-red."

Under the Conservation Law, a special pre-season bear hunt can be established when damage to camps and resorts warrants an ad-ditional reduction of the bear pop-

ulation.
Colson said the Department's regional game managers indicated that the drop in bear damage complaints did not seem to reflect a drop in the state's bear population. "There snould be plenty of bear around by the start of the regular big game gunning season on October 25", he said.
