As ACS began a new school year on September 7, the record books showed an increase in the total number of students from last year. Total enrollment for last year was 581. This year the mass number of students has increased to 591.

Last year in Grades K-6 there was a total of 333 students. Enrollment this year has increased to 339. In the 64-65 school year, there were 80 pupils enrolled in the Junior High department. This year there are 85.

The High School department shows the only sign of decrease in enrollment. Last year there were 168 students. For the 65-66 season, there are 167 pupils registered.


