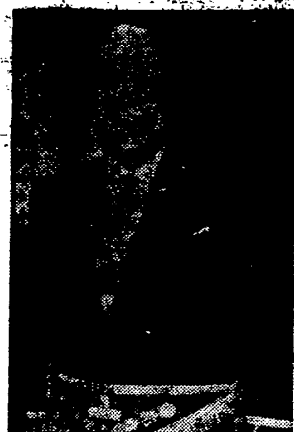

Andover Lodge 558 To Celebrate 100th Anniversary

Andover Lodge No. 558, of Andover, N. Y., will celebrate its 100th Anniversary on Sunday, October 10, with a dinner for 200 Masons which will be served at the Andover Central School at 6 p. m. After the dinner at 8 p. m. there will be a general meeting in the Andover Central School to which everyone is invited. At this meeting Judge Clarence J. Henry, State Masonic Grand Master will speak on the subject of "Passing Into The Afterlife".

At the Centennial Meeting at 8 p. m., the Invocation and Benediction will be given by William L. De Long, Grand Sword Bearer of Grand Lodge. Introductions will be made by the Master of the Lodge, George R. Hall of Whitesville, George C. Derx, Sr., of Angelica, District Deputy Grand Master, will assist in the program. Judy Henry will be accompanied by John M. Driggs, Senior Grand Deacon of Rochester and Howard W. Niven, Grand Marshal, also of Rochester.

Judge Henry is a graduate of the University of Rochester and Harvard Law School. He was elected District Attorney of Monroe County in 1949, then Monroe County Judge, in 1960 was elected Justice of the New York State Supreme Court. Raised in Seneca Lodge 920, and Potentate of Damascus Temple in 1955, Judge Henry received the Honorary 33rd Degree in 1956. In May 1964 he was elected Grand Master of Masons in New York State.

4-H Conservation And Forestry Club

Boys and girls age 9 to 19 and interested adults are invited to attend an Enrollment Meeting, tomorrow evening, Friday, October 1st at 7:30, in the School Shop Room.

Conservation and Forestry Projects have not been a large part of 4-H work in our locality in recent years. Now, however, it is planned to develop these projects within the framework of a 4-H Club specifically oriented to conservation and forestry. Wildlife study will be included.

Two color films will be shown during the evening. The first, "Rainbow Valley", covers the multiple benefits of the national forests in the form of timber, water, wildlife, and recreation. These are things which should be of interest to all residents of this area particularly in light of the ever increasing need for outdoor recreational facilities. In the years ahead, rapidly expanding urban populations will be looking for areas such as ours in which to spend their leisure time.

The second film is titled "Five Colorful Birds" and it shows the Goldfinch, Cedar Waxwing, Scarlet Tanager, Woodpecker, and Eastern Bluebird in their natural habitats. The way in which these birds feed and protect their young, their nesting habits, and protective coloration of their plumage are described and brilliantly illustrated in this color film.

There is no Membership Fee in 4-H and there are no dues unless voted by club members. The Allegany County 4-H Executive Committee discourages dues in local clubs.

Any member of 4-H who will be 12 years of age by Jan. 1, 1966, is eligible to receive 1000 trees, free of charge, for Spring planting. This is sponsored by the State Conservation Department.

Carl R. Burdick, former Andover Central School Board President and now Allegany County Forester will be present for a discussion period during which he will answer questions and outline some of his responsibilities in managing more than two thousand acres of County owned forest lands and recreation areas.

Please tell your friends about this meeting and bring them along if possible. Remember — Tomorrow night at the School — 7:30 — 4-H Conservation and Forestry. Any adults interested in helping young people in this activity will be welcomed.
