Two Immunization Clinics will be held at the Andover Central School under the direction of Dr. S. B. Scott, Health Officer.

Immunization for your child should be done by your family physician. If this cannot be done by your doctor, the Health Department in cooperation with the Education Department is holding two clinics at the Andover Central School.

Children can be protected against Diphtheria, Pertussis (Whooping Cough), Tetanus (Lockjaw), Smallpox, Poliomyelitis & Measles.

Children from three months of age may receive protection at these clinics.

1st dose of Triple and Double Toxoid (Diphtheria, Pertussis, Tetanus)

Salk Polio Vaccine—1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th doses
