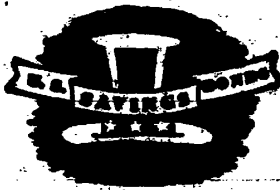
Registration In Andover

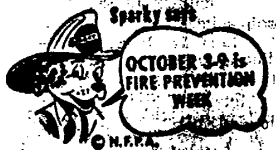
