EDITORIAL COMMENT ON AMENDMENTS (Continued From Last Week)

Amendment No. One — Budget Deadline

This amendment would change the date for the submission of the State Budget by the Governor to the Legislature and the public to "on or before February following the election of a Governor, and in all other years "on or before the second Tuesday following the first day of the annual meeting of the Legislature.

This would provide for 9 to 15 more days for consideration of the Budget than the existing date of February 1.

We recommend a YES Vote for Amendment No. One.

Amendment No. Two - Town Judges

This proposed amendment changes the requirement that the term of town court justices shall be four years to - "not less than four years". This would permit terms of more than four years.

We feel that a four year term is long enough for any public official to serve. If he has done a bang up job, he can always be re-elected for another 4 year term. Unot — four years is long enough to put up with dead wood, so the public shouldn't be stuck any longer. We say NO to this one.

Amendment No. Three — Four-Year Terms

This proposed amendment would increase the terms of our state senators and assemblymen from two to four years beginning with the November 1966 election. While the longer term would cut campaign time by half to permit more time for law making instead of vote getting, the longer term reduces the opportunity for the voters to bring their elected representatives to account.

We recommend a NO Vote for this Amendment. Amendment No. Four — Public Nursing Homes

This proposal would give the Legislature the pov er to provide nursing homes for persons of low income. It would also permit state and local loans for construction of nursing homes for persons of low income, and

This proposal for government invasion of the nursing home field would further increase the property tax burden on local homeowners and renters—so we motfully have to say NO to this one!

Amendment No. Five — Middle Income Housing

This proposed amendment would allow the State and municipalities to make loans to partnerships and trusts for the construction of middle-income housing. Right now such loans can only be made to housing corporations.

These projects can be exempted from up to 50% of their real property taxes. This loss in local property tax revenue is shifted to the property owners and renters in a community by a higher property tax rate.

This new subsidy program is similar to one turned down by the voters when placed on the ballot in 1962 We recommend a NO Vote on this one!

Amendment No. Six — Amending The Constitution

Under the legislative process of amending the State Constitution, a proposed amendment must be approved by two consecutively elected Legislatures before being submitted to the voters.

This provision was enacted by the framers of the Constitution as a protection against ill-considered or hasty action and a double safeguard against violation of the will of the people.

Changing this would remove the safeguard of bringing each Legislator to account for his action on an amendment before it is taken up a second time.

We recommend a NO Vote on this one also!

Proposed Amendments No. Seven, Eight, and Nine do not affect the voters except in the specific areas mentioned. Since it doesn't apply to us, we feel that it is up to the people in those affected areas to decide these questions for themselves-so let them vote the way they want to.

they are to have reasonable expection of delivery prior to Christmas.

Those who are planning to send
Christmas gifts in addition to
Christmas cards and letters should Christmas cards and letters should check at the Post Office regarding size and weight limitations and the best method of packing gifts for delivery. Each box should be well tied with strong cord. Unless completely packed and tightly filled boxes are likely to be crushed. Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent any rattling or loosening of articles within the package. Forms 2966 and 2976 a Customs Declaration completed by the senders are required on parcels to many destinations.
