Abstract of Proposition
Number 176 of the Laws of 1965, to be known as the Pure Waters Bond Act, authorizes, upor terms and conditions to be imposed by the Legislature, the creation of a state debt in the smount of one hillion dollars to provide monies to be used, upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may impose, for the construction, reconstruction and improvement of sewage treatment facilities to combat water pollution.
