The FHA girls attended a rally Wednesday at Bolivar. They left school at three o'clock and returned at six.

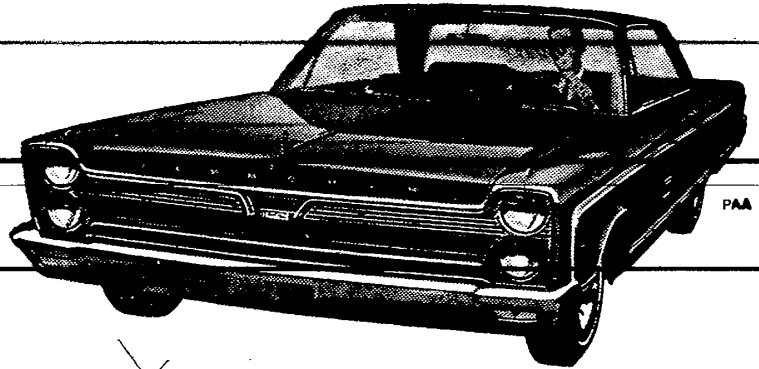
## Purple And White
