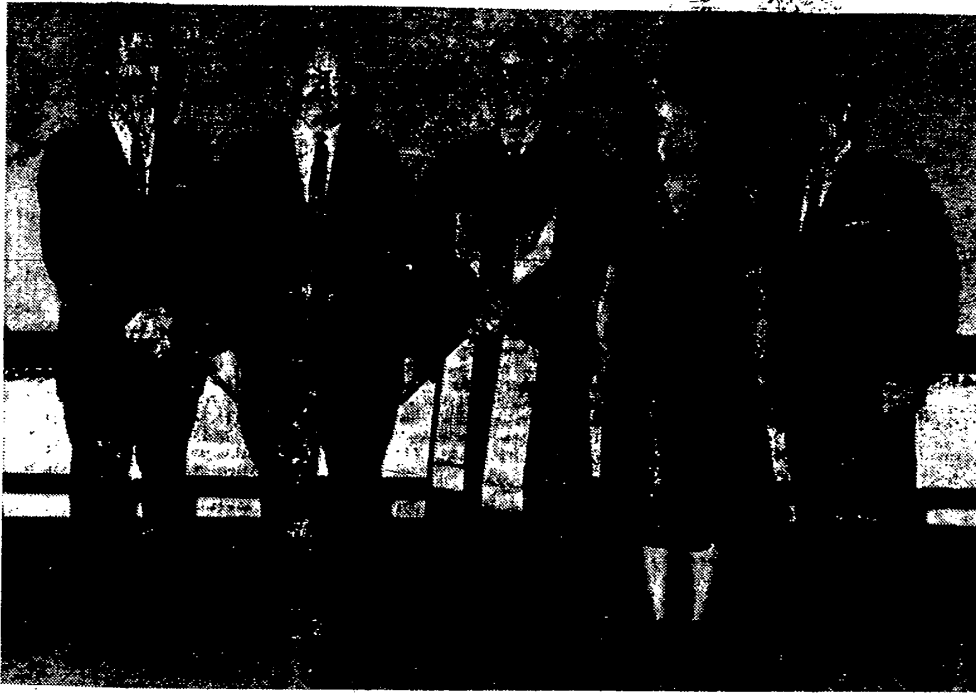

125th Anniversary Of Andover Methodist Church

Sunday, October 24, 1965, around 250 Members, Guests and Visiting Clergymen attended the 125th Anniversary Celebration of the Andover Methodist Church. Reverend Roger F. Williams, Pastor, was in charge of the Worship Services which were held at 11:15 A. M., 3:00 P. M., and again at 8:00 P. M.

The Sermon, "Making All Things New", at the Morning Services was given by the Reverend Dr. Gilbert W. Wieting, District Superintendent of the Western New York Conference in the Olean District.

At the afternoon Services, letters were read from former Pastors, Members, Officials and Friends congratulating the Church and Members on the Anniversary occasion.

Two former Pastors present at the Services, The Reverend Helena L. Champlin, 1939-42, from Wyoming, N. Y., and Reverend W. Donald Shearer, 1943-46, from New York; were recognized and participated in the observance.

Local and neighboring Ministers present included Floyd Aldrich, Andover Baptist Church; Willis V. Poole, Andover Presbyterian Church; Reverend C. Perkins, Bolivar, N. Y.; Glenn E. Mrs. Ralph Burgett who has been a musician for over 50 years, was Organist for all three services, while the full choir presented five choral presentations under the leadership of Harold Huffcut, Choir Director.

The WSCS sponsored a tea at 5 P. M., which was open to the public and served a 25 year birthday cake, sandwiches, tea and coffee, pickles and mints to the guests with Mrs. Charles Ruger in charge of the refreshment committee. Mrs. Grace Burger and Mrs. Esther Tuttle poured, assisted by other members of the committee.

Nearly a dozen 50 year members from Andover attended the afternoon service which included Mrs. Hazel Burgett, Mr. Charles B. Caple, Mrs. Addie Cook, Mrs. Lula Emery, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Kemp, Mrs. Rita Myers, Mrs. John Nobles, Mrs. Charles Ruger, and Mrs. Lynn Trowbridge. The oldest member present was Mrs. Florence E. Earley who is in her 86th year.

Most of the members and guests stopped to look over, admire, and reminisce over the historical exhibit which was a veritable museum. This consisted mainly of old photos, old newspaper clippings and newspapers themselves, with the oldest ones dating back to the latter portion of the 1890's. Many of the photos of the older generation and "Senior Citizens" were loaned by Claire C. Backus, former Owner and Editor of the Andover News and who is presently semi-retired.

According to Reverend Williams Pastor of the Church, so much interest was shown in the exhibit that it will be kept on display for a short while longer and will be open to the public on Thursday and Friday evenings, October 28th and 29th. He also expressed his appreciation and gratitude to all of the people that loaned items for the exhibit as well as everyone else that helped make this commemoration such a big success.

The Andover Chamber of Commerce will sponsor the Annual Hallowe'en Parade, with refreshments for the youngsters of Andover.

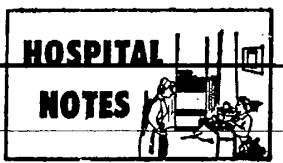
President, James H. Kessler has designated Saturday, October 30th as "Hobgoblin Entertainment Night", with a program designed to amuse children both large and small.
