Monday, November 8, 1965 at 9:30 A. M.

The Second Immunization Clinic will be held at the Andover Central School under the direction of Dr. S. B. Saett, Health Officer. Children can be protected against Diphtheria, Pertussis (Whooping Cough), Tetanus (Lockjaw), Smallpox and Polio-mylitis.

Immunization for your child should be done by your family physician. If this cannot be done by your doctor, the Health Department in co-operation with the Education Department is holding this clinic at the Andover Central School.

Children from three months of age may receive protection at this clinic.

Well folks, election is over now and for many months we will undoubtedly hear claims and counter-claims from both parties—but not about the results—but the trends instead.

In Andover, the only one that didn't carry (and that was fairly close 133-187) was about the Early Budget Submission, Amendment No. 1. However, it did carry in the County (3,704—3,552), and at the present time with incomplete returns, is leading in the State (590,271—487,862).

The expenditure of vast amounts of the taxpayers money for Public Housing and other Socialistic Programs were voted down ranging from 2-1, to 3-1 proportions.

Is it because we have such a short memory that we don't remember how they voted on many of these highly controversial issues? Or perhaps the Newspapers aren't informing the public at election time how their Representatives voted on past issues?

If you can figure this out, how about letting us in on it so it can be corrected in the future?

In addition to Election being over with—so is Halloween, and we will certainly have to give credit is due!

We take our hats off to the young people of Andover as well as to their parents for the good sense and judgement shown over the occasion—especially when the weather was so nice for the evening.
