

### Local C of C Starts Plan To 'Beautify' Main St.

Yesterday, with the placing of the new planters along Main St., by the F.F.A. members of ACS, the Chamber of Commerce plans to "beautify" Main St., was commenced.

The Chamber of Commerce plans to furnish Christmas trees of the same size and height to be put in these planters, and will then ask the businessmen to co-operate and decorate the trees with colored lights. After the Holidays, the lights will be removed of course, but the trees will be left standing until spring.

As soon as it is feasible in the spring, the trees will be removed and gayly colored petunias will be furnished by the Chamber of Commerce to plant in these planter boxes.

The Chamber of Commerce furnished the redwood and hardware for the building of these twenty planter boxes which are two feet square and two feet high.

These attractive planter boxes were built at the Andover Central School by Mr. Barden's Industrial Art classes and Mr. Russell's Vocational Agriculture classes. Many good lessons in mass production and construction problems were learned by the students and teachers in the completion of this project.

With the planters containing Christmas trees throughout the winter season and petunias from the spring thru summer season, our local Main Street will be graced with some attractive year-round decorations.

While these planters are not highly finished, expensive articles of commercial industry, they were built by local youths in our local school as a community service project that will be enjoyed and benefit us all.

Then of course, with the Deer Season in full swing, we have to at least cover part of the news and stories. We were informed that "Mike" Smith got his deer at 7:02 Monday A. M.; and Dave Vickers got his later the same day. We also saw that Sonny Lehman and his neighbors had their hanging up Monday night. Then Thursday afternoon we heard that the "Dead-eye Dick" nailed his buck that afternoon.

Of course there were several other tales of hunters bagging their deer as early as Sunday before the season started.

We understand that "Hal" Sisson was riding out in the Country with his Dad and other company Sunday when he spotted something that caught his eye. Hal asked his Dad to stop the car and check it out. Dad, leaving down a trail in the field. His father thought that the young man's imagination was playing tricks on him since all that could be seen was the horn which looked like branches on a tree at that distance. However, Dad finally decided to humor the lad and backed up and waited while Hal went over to investigate. But — Lo and Behold! — the young man was right! The 8-point Buck was dead but still warm—so must have been shot a little earlier that day. It was reported to the proper authorities but to our knowledge the hunter wasn't caught.

In a news release taken from the Wellsville Reporter, we noticed that several other early birds didn't fare so well. It seems that Carlton Greene and his son who live in Railroad Valley, near Tip Top, stumbled, onto a still-twitching deer on their property, surprising two men who ran for their car. The four men were arrested and accused of jack-lighting deer and are awaiting Grand Jury action at the Allegany County seat in Belmont.

Then this past Sunday morning we were rather abruptly awakened by a phone call reporting that an injured Buck had invaded the back-yard of the Village Office and was demanding police protection. However, by the time the law arrived on the scene, the quarry was gone as some young lads, not realizing that the deer was in need of protective custody, chased it across the backyards to Dyke Creek, and away it went "over the hill".

We also had a report of a strange visitor coming to root to Andover for a short spell. Ralph Miles reported seeing a strange bird of rather large proportions out in his front yard and came up with a good description of it. After checking up with School authorities and giving a full "MO" on the bird, the decision passed down was that it was a Blue Heron. We have seen many Herons before but aren't familiar

### 49th Annual Christmas Seal Drive Open

Peter R. Sprague of Cuba, attorney, will head the 1965 Christmas Seal Campaign in Allegany County, it has been announced by Mrs. Wayne C. Stout, president of the Health Association of Allegany County, Inc.

Stressing that "tuberculosis and the other respiratory diseases are far from licked," Mr. Sprague announced November 16th the official opening of the associations' 49th Annual Christmas Seal Drive for contributions.

Volunteers have been working steadily the past month preparing the Seals for mailing, revising mailing lists and assisting with the addressing of envelopes for the campaign.

Mr. Sprague pointed out that new scientific findings emphasize that respiratory diseases, including TB, are a continuing public health problem. "To deal effectively with the many lung-damaging ailments a productive Christmas Seal drive is essential," he said.

"Medical experts tell us that eventually TB can be wiped out, and other lung-damaging illnesses reasonably controlled. But success depends on improved prevention, detection and treatment. In this we will play our part, as we have done for many years. To do the job, though, we need the help of generous givers, both old friends and new contributors."

Last year's Christmas Seal Campaign raised \$9,345 to finance the Health Association's year-round community health activities. Mr. Sprague emphasized that to maintain these activities now demands more money, due to raising costs and that planned expansion of services depends on raising a still larger sum.

"There are many possibilities for research and action programs to combat respiratory diseases. But there must be financing available to seize these possibilities."

"Christmas Seals have been part of this county's voluntary battle against TB for 48 years and contributing to the campaign gives everyone the chance to join this battle, which now has been expanded to include all the lung-damaging diseases."
