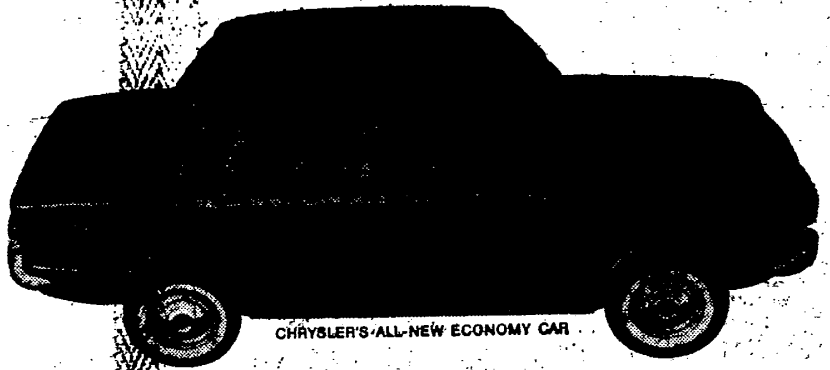
Leaflet Explains Contribution Increase

A small leaflet, prepared by the Social Security Administration, is available to employers as a payroll check stuffer. The leaflet explains the increase in the social security contribution rate and amount of earnings on which the tax is paid, set for January 1, 1966. L. J. Dziadkiewicz, social security district manager in Olean, N. Y., announces. The leaflet shows how these increases will affect a worker's take home pay; how his contribution helps finance retirement, survivors, and disability insurance benefits; how they will pay the costs of the hospital insurance part of medicare; and why they are necessary.

The handy size of the leaflet will allow it to be easily inserted in payroll envelopes. Employers should get in touch with Olean social security district office, located at 132 N. First St., for more information about the leaflet.

"We can provide employers with a supply of these informative leaflets without charge. But the supply is limited and employers should make their requests early."

The Olean district manager also announced that employers could arrange with his office for a representative to call at a place of business for interviews with older workers especially those who are or will be age 65 in the near future. The telephone number is 572-1320.

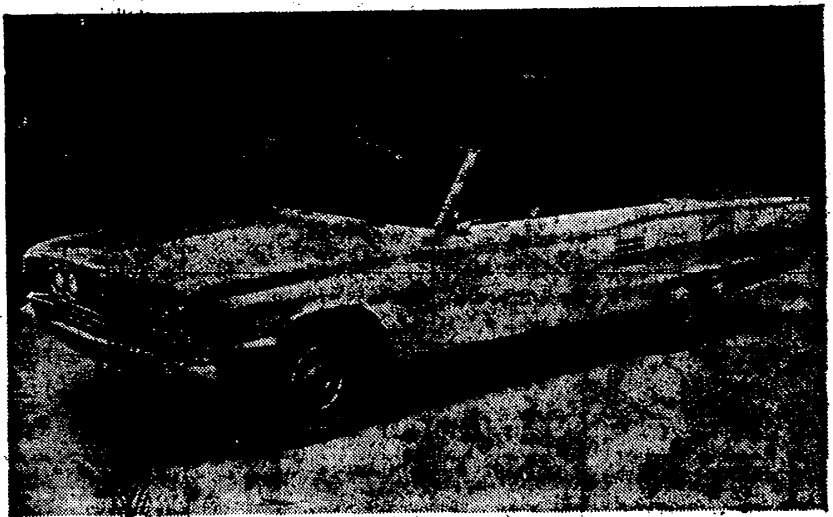
