Starting this month and concluding next month, is another big innovation in the N. Y. State Department of Motor Vehicles registration program—converting records over to electronic tape and issuing new “permanent-type” plates.

This program, like any other new program, is bound to have a few flaws or “bugs” in it. However, in checking with the Motor Vehicle Department, we are told: “Most of the questions which vehicle owners are asking — are already answered in the brochure — if they would only take time to read it”.

Just because we don't like the whopping big 50% raise in our Auto Registration FEE — doesn't mean that we should give the license bureau a hard time. After all, it was the Governor and our elected State Congressmen that crammed this down our throats.

Thus the sensible thing to do; is to read the directions over carefully, check for mistakes in the new form against your re-newal stub on your expiring license, fill it out as directed — and to the best of your ability, count slowly to ten as you make out the check — then mail it in early.

We'll bet that at least 95% of you motorists will get your plates back in due time without any problem. We did anyway — and they do look pretty sharp — although we can't display them until January 1st.

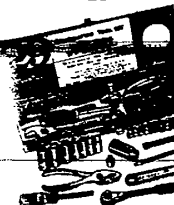

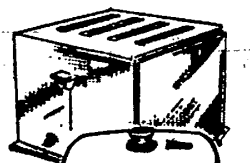

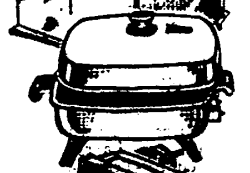
